Work Begins on the Old Garage



Geoff Powlyle, Craig Wheatly and Brian Honeyman, explain how they will stabilize the front wall by adding steel bearers. They have made reinforced foundations for support posts. They expect that they will finish this first stage of the work by next week 15 June.

The next step is to remove the dead ivy from the northern wall. It is expected that this wall will remain standing as it was reinforced by community members several years ago.

The paving that was done when the garage was turned into a garden is still sound. It is hoped that a working bee will restore the gardens to their former glory using native plants that will attract local birds, as well as providing a pleasant place for residents and visitors to relax.

Eva's daughter was married in the Old Garage and Kath Frappell remembers when it burnt down. Apparently the gas cylinders exploded and it was heard all over town! The windows of the post office were smashed as were the windows in the pub.

After the front and back walls are stabilized it is hoped that the south wall will be rebuilt so that it is a court-yard again.

Eventually it is hoped to put some story boards inside to make an outdoor museum.

The Garage

The garage was built by Alf Moxon who lived in a house where Moxon Park is now situated. He was the town's builder and he built several concrete homes in the area.

The garage was also a concrete building and served as his own garage and workshop.

In later years it was used as a wool skin an hide business, before being used again as a garage for mechanical repairs.

Several different proprietors worked the garage over the years, until it was destroyed by a disastrous fire.

Years later the locals decided what remained of the old building did nothing to enhance the street, so a group of energetic people made an effort to try and beautify the area.

The thistles, weeds and debris left after the fire and the pit, which was approximately two metres deep, down the centre of the interior floor, made the area unsafe as well as unattractive.

The Wellington Council provided the soil to fill the pit and after much voluntary labour, the area was levelled and ready for paving.

The bricks were used from the old homes that were demolished in the area where the park is now.

Noel and Helen Grimes at this time owned the shop next to the old garage and Noel took on the position of "Master Paver." The ladies carried the bricks which were stacked on the back fence for Noel to perform his creative style of paving. He also spoke to the owner of the John Smith Nursery in Dubbo and he sold the trees to us at a discount.

A raffle was held and Noel sold tickets in his shop, which enabled us to purchase the plants for the gardens in the garage area.

A seat was made out of logs and placed inside.

Ivy was planted on the shop wall of the old building and eventually both side walls were covered in Ivy and Native Passionfruit.

Working bees and voluntary work kept the old garage inviting and interesting.

It has been a venue for weddings and on New Year's Day in the year 2000 a Combined Church Service was held in the old garage to open the celebrations, which were held in the park.

After the southern wall collapsed and with much discussion with Council, a new phase now begins in the life of the "Old Garage".

Natalie Bennett has donated her many hours of work to this project which is nearing completion.


Natalie has been liaising with Ruth Pope and Norma Hannelly to ensure the information is correct.
